Dear Assemblymen and Assemblywomen:

As individuals and organizations dedicated to reducing deaths and injuries caused by All-Terrain Vehicles (ATVs) and Utility Recreational Off-Highway Vehicle (ROVs), we urge you to oppose efforts to increase the types, and the number, of vehicles designed for off road use on the roads of New York.

We understand that the Assembly companion bill of S01946-A, which recently passed the Senate, is being considered by the Ways and Means Committee. A04971-A would increase the weight limit of off road vehicles that can be registered and driven on some public roads, already designated for ATV use, from 1,000 to 1,500 pounds. This would allow ROVs access to roads and is contrary to public safety as it puts the operator and others at risk of severe injury or death.

ROVs should not be driven on public roads because driving them on public roads is more dangerous than operating them off-road, and they are not designed for roadway use.

Manufacturer owners' manuals have warnings against operating ROVs on public roads (risk of collision) or paved surfaces because ROV tires (and this is true of ATV tires as well) are not designed for paved surfaces and such surfaces may adversely affect the handling of the ROV.¹

The Recreational Off-Highway Vehicle Association (ROHVA), a non-profit safety awareness association sponsored by the manufacturers of ATVs and ROVs, has established ROV safety rules which include:

Avoid paved surfaces. ROVs are designed to be operated off-highway.²

While there is currently very little data on ROV deaths, our coalition has begun tracking ATV and ROV deaths through news reports. From January through June 13th we recorded 28 deaths related to ROV use nationwide. These are potentially dangerous and extremely powerful vehicles that must be used in accordance with their design. They are not designed for on-road use and should stay off of roads.

Since not all ATV and ROV related deaths are reported in the newspaper and not all papers are online, this count is an underestimate. In addition, because newspapers frequently identify all off-road vehicles as ATVS, some ROVs may be classified as ATVs in the data—further increasing the likely number of ROV related deaths.

We urge you to oppose expanding ROV use to the roads of New York State because it places the public, including operators, pedestrians, bicyclists, and all motor vehicle drivers and their passengers at unnecessary risk.
